



1:72 Eighth Air Force - Boeing B-17G™ and Bomber Resupply Set

The United States Army Air Force (USAAF) Eighth Air Force was created during World War II to support the Allied invasion of German occupied Europe by flying day-time strategic bombing missions from bases in Eastern England.

By late 1944 the Eighth Air Force's air war over occupied Europe was at its height. Everyday hundreds of Boeing B-17 Flying Fortress and Consolidated B-24 Liberator bombers would head over German held territory, braving flak, German fighters and the weather to deliver bombs onto targets. Damage to returning aircraft was commonplace which often led to the cannibalisation of badly damaged airframes to keep others flying. The silver port wing on the B-17G depicted in this kit is an example of this practice and it is a testament to the skill and hard work of the ground crews that so many aircraft were kept serviceable in this way.

Also included in this set are some of the ground vehicles vital to the refuelling and rearming of the bombers: Autocar U-7144-T 4X4 tractor unit and F-1 fuel trailer. The U-7144-T was used extensively by the US military from 1942 onwards and was certainly found on most, if not all USAAF airfields in Britain, particularly in conjunction with the standard F-1 fuel trailer. With many aircraft requiring refuelling on a daily basis, it was usual for each base to have numerous examples of the U-7144-T available at any one time. La Huitième Armée de l'air américaine (8th USAAF) fut établie pendant la Deuxième Guerre mondiale pour soutenir l'invasion alliée de l'Europe occupée par les Allemands. Elle effectuait des missions de bombardement stratégique de jour à partir de bases dans l'est de l'Angleterre. À la fin de 1944, la 8th USAAF était au plus fort de son activité au-dessus de l'Europe occupée. Chaque jour, des centaines de bombardiers Boeing B-17 Flying Fortress et Consolidated B-24 Liberator survolaient le territoire défendu par les Allemands, tout en bravant le tir antiaérien, les chasseurs ennemis et les intempéries pour larguer des bombes contre leurs cibles. De retour, les composants des cellules endommagées étaient souvent récupérés pour permettre l'opération d'autres avions. L'aile gauche argentée du B-17G illustré dans ce coffret en est un exemple typique, témoignant des compétences et du travail acharné des équipes au sol qui maintenaient en service tant d'appareils de cette façon.

De plus, ce coffret contient quelques véhicules terrestres essentiels au ravitaillement et au réarmement des bombardiers :

Tracteur Autocar U-7144-T 4X4 et remorque à carburant F-1. À partir de 1942, les forces armées américaines utilisaient beaucoup les U-7144-T qui se trouvaient sur la plupart des aérodromes USAAF en Grande-Bretagne, surtout avec la remorque à carburant F-1 standard. Chaque base aérienne disposait habituellement de plusieurs exemplaires du tracteur U-7144-T disponible à tout moment car de nombreux avions avaient besoin d'être ravitaillés quotidiennement.

Die United States Army Air Force (USAAF) Eighth Air Force wurde im Zweiten Weltkrieg als Teilstreitkraft zur Unterstützung der Alliierten Invasion der von Deutschland besetzten Teile von Europa geschaffen. Zu diesem Zweck wurden strategische Bombenangriffe von Luftwaffen im Osten von England aus geflogen.

Ende 1944 waren die Luftkämpfe der Eighth Air Force im besetzten Europa dann auf ihr Höhepunkt. Tag für Tag flogen damals vor allem schwere Bomber vom Typ Boeing B-17 Flying Fortress und Consolidated B-24 Liberator über deutsche Machtgebiete, wo sie oft heftigem Flakfeuer, Jagdflugzeugen der Luftwaffe und dem Wetter ausgesetzt waren, um dort Bomben möglichst genau abzuwerfen. Die Flugzeuge waren daher häufig beschädigt. Deshalb mussten schwerbeschädigte Flugwerke oft als Ersatzteile benutzt werden, um leichter zu Schaden gekommene Maschinen wieder flugtauglich zu machen. Wie in diesem Bausatz wiedergegebene silberne Tragflächenhälften einer B-17G dient als Beispiel dafür. Sie repräsentieren die Fähigkeiten und hohen Leistungen der Bodenmannschaften, die das Flugzeug einsatzbereit halten konnten.

Außerdem enthält dieses Set Modelle von Bodenfahrzeugen, die zum Auftanken wie auch zu Beladung mit Waffen der Bomber entscheidend waren:

Autocar U-7144-T 4X4 Zugmaschine und F-1 Kraftstofftrailer. Die Amerikaner setzten ab 1942 Zugfahrzeuge vom Typ U-7144-T ein, die bald auf den meisten wenn nicht allen USAAF-Flugfeldern in Großbritannien zu finden waren, ganz besonders in Verbindung mit dem normalerweise damit verwendeten F-1 Kraftstofftrailer.
