#### 1/48 Armstrong-Whitworth F.K.8 Instruction for Standard Version K1029, K1030, K1031







The Armstrong Whitworth F.K.8 was a Sritish WW1 two seater reconnaissance and bomber aircraft used by the Royal Flying Corps.

It was sturdy and dependable, designer by Dutch designer Frederick Koolhoven and intended as a replacement for the Royal Aircraft Factory's BE.2c and Armstrong Whitworth's earlier F.K. 3.

Around 1700 F.K.8 aircraft were produced, and it served on the Western Front and other theatres where it was useful for reconnaissance, artillery spotting, ground attack and also bombing duties.

Despite its popularity with the men who flew it, the F.K.8 was unfairly overshadowed by the better known R.E.3 and today is one of the lesser known British two seaters of WW1.

Known affectionately to airmen as the "Big Ack", the F.K. 8 type first flew in 1916 and was developed in various stages. It was powered by a 120 hp Beardmore engine and reatured a box-like oleo with skid shock absorber undercarriage and two A-shaped radiators straddling both sides of the fuselage and receining as an inverted V near the top wing.


The F.K.8's standard arryament featured a Lewis gun on a Scarff ring for the observer and a fixed forward firing .303 Vickers machine gun for the pilot. The first F.K. 8's went to France in January 1917 equipping 35 Squadron RFC. It served with five squadrons on the Western Front and also saw service in the Middle East as well as Home Defence duties in Britain. The last squadron to use the F.K.8 was 150 Squadron which was distanced in 1919. Two Victoria Crosses were won by F.K. 8 pilots.

At the war's end eight F.K.8 aircraft were registered for civil use, with two of them used in Australia as part of the early fleet of the Queensland and Northern Territory Aerial Services which later became the airline Qantas.








Decals and PE for F.K.8 Mid./K1030


